Rufus Benjamin Weaver

1841-1936 Grave: Mount Vernon Cemetery

Philadelphia

Rufus was a professor and doctor who was the first to take apart the nervous system. He also found lost soldiers of war, and helped them to be buried in Oakwood.

Sophia Arms Patridge

1817-1881 Grave: HOC, Heck Sec. Plot 3

Sophia Partridge is remembered as an advocate for Ceremonial Confederate Day, and establishing a section for Confederates in the Oakwood Cemetery.

Dr. Mike Hoke

1874-1944 Grave: Pullen Sec. Lot 43

Dr. Michael is known for his orthopedic bone carpentry and work at Warm Springs hospital.

Jesse Broyles was known as "Raleigh's Peanut Man" for the better part of 20 years. From about 1963 to 1981 he sold peanuts on the grounds of the old state capitol at the end of Fayetteville Street. Tourists would feed the many pigeons that gathered around him and his cart. Jesse loved the birds, and was kind to the people too.

Stella Kilpatrick

1881-1969 Grave: Magnolia Hill Sec. Plot 42

Stella Kitzpatrick was an amazing nurse in the 1950s who was strongly against mass medication of fluoride in Raleigh public water supply. She promoted the United States Nurse Reserve.

John Wesley Jenkins

1832 -1906 Grave: Magnolia Hill Sec. Lot A-8

John Wesley Jenkins was a pastor in the 1860s who opened up one of Raleigh's premiere orphanages, the Methodist Orphanage in Raleigh.

Needham B. Broughton

1848-1914 Grave: Magnolia Hill Sec. Lot B-1

N.B. Broughton was a talented printer his namesake lives on at Broughton High School.
